The Board is thrilled to report the successful completion of Stages 1 and 2 of the Hospice refurbishment, bringing us closer to our vision of a modern and welcoming facility for patients, families, visitors, and staff. 10 of the 15 hospice rooms have now been completely refurbished – and they look fantastic! A huge improvement. Furthermore, we have already commenced Stage 3 of the project which will result in the final 5 rooms being completed – hopefully by Christmas.

We extend our heartfelt thanks to all who have generously donated to this project. Your support has been the cornerstone of our progress, and we are truly humbled by your dedication. Every contribution, no matter the size, has brought us closer to our goal.

In our pursuit of creating a comfortable and secure space for countless patients in the years ahead, we have decided to utilise recent bequests left to the Foundation to help complete this project. The impact of these gifts will resonate for many years to come.

In addition to funding the refurbishment, the Foundation has continued to fund various programs conducted in the Hospice and within the Home Care Program. These include complementary therapies (both skin and massage); Fra Angelico Art; Pet therapy; family kitchen supplies; funding additional education hours for the nurses; and funding individual patient requests. These programs are designed to provide additional support for patients and their families – over and above the wonderful care provided by the doctors and nurses.

Raising funds in the current economic environment is a challenge for all charities at the moment. Consequently, our Board has been hard at work shaping a new strategic plan that centres on meeting the evolving needs of patients and families. We are exploring new revenue raising sources to broaden our funding base.



Financial Overview



The refurbishment of patient rooms and bathrooms in Mary Potter is behind the sharp rise in our level of support over the last 12 months.

Our net operating surplus for the year was \$288,132 which is extremely pleasing. And due to the incredible generosity of nine bequestors, we have transferred \$800,000 to a provision for FY24, to complete the refurbishment project in Mary Potter Hospice.

Message from our Executive Director At the heart of everything we do is you – thank you



Dear Members & Supporters,

Thank you for choosing to donate, volunteer and attend our events during 2022-2023. We never lose sight of the fact that donors and supporters make the magic happen. Thank you for being at the heart of everything we do.

Mary Potter Hospice

Over the last 12 months, so much has been achieved including a project close to my heart – the refurbishment of Mary Potter Hospice. There is still a way to go, but by Christmas 2023 the work will be complete. This project was started pre-COVID, so it has been a lengthy process, with many interruptions, but the Hospice is slowly transforming into a beautiful butterfly.

It was a bequest that sparked the refurbishment and nearly \$2 million later, the accommodation will soon be at a standard that reflects the quality of the care. Thank you to everyone who has donated to this project and to the group of bequestors who made the decision to leave a gift in their will, many years ago. Their gifts will bless hundreds of patients and families for many years to come.

Despite the Hospice being a building site for most of the year, over 260 families were grateful for the opportunity to receive loving care for someone special in their life. Your support of the Family Kitchen, the Family Room, all the programs and the hundreds of individual patient requests, added another layer of care that really sets the Hospice apart from any other facility providing end-of-life care.

Palliative Home Care Service

The Foundation's role continues to grow in the Home Care service, with over 110 requests for help during the year. Recognising special celebrations such as birthdays and anniversaries were the most popular. When the nurse arrives at a patient's home with a bunch of flowers, they are so touched by this thoughtful gesture. This level of care is so unexpected, but very much appreciated.

With your help, we also funded equipment hire, particularly for the patients under 65 who are not eligible for government support.

Calvary Cancer Services

Our support this year was 'business as usual'. With four RESTORE workshops and 11 sessions of complementary therapies each week, we were able to serve hundreds of grateful patients. Furthermore, with your help, a cold-cap machine was purchased for the Cancer Centre in Elizabeth Vale, providing a valuable service for many patients in the northern suburbs.

Thank you for entrusting your gifts to us and for helping Calvary continue to be a centre of excellence for palliative care in SA.

The Family Kitchen

Over the last 12 months, the Family Kitchen provided much needed support for families and hospitality for visitors to the Hospice. Thanks to the generous support of a family trust (who wish to remain anonymous) and our wonderful donors, the Family Kitchen was able to supply fresh cakes and sandwiches daily, tea and coffee 24/7, as well as a selection of cold drinks and snacks, all free of charge.

The kitchen gives families a resource they never expected but wholeheartedly appreciate. It is so valuable to everyone, particularly for those who come to the Hospice direct from work or school, or who do not wish to leave their loved one's side. The kitchen also offers somewhere to have a break and is also a meeting place where family members get to know others who are in a similar situation. This can provide great comfort when you are feeling quite alone. Just like at home, the Family Kitchen helps our families feel loved and cared for.

Complementary Therapies

This program offers patients and families complementary therapies including massage and beauty therapy. The benefits of this program range from helping to reduce pain and stress, providing relaxation, to simply feeling pampered during a difficult time. All therapies are delivered either in our retreat room or bedside, depending on patient preference. Thanks to your kindness, we were able to extend these therapies to palliative patients in St Helens Ward, twice a week.

Fra Angelico

The Fra Angelico Creative Arts program gives patients the opportunity to create simple and unique art using hand and fingerprints on ceramics. Quite often the finished pieces become lasting mementos treasured by their families.



Pet Therapy

Along with encouraging patients' pets to visit, thanks to your support, we were able to facilitate weekly visits by therapy dogs and other animals in the Hospice. These animals and their owners make their way around the Hospice giving love and cuddles to patients and families. These visits are particularly special for animal-loving patients who are brought so much joy just being in the presence of a gentle four-legged friend.

Life Stories

This program offers patients an opportunity to share their life stories or record special reflections, times, or events. Trained volunteers visit patients to gather information which is then presented to them in the form of a special bound document. It is about sharing words and affirming the value of each person's life in the moments where it matters most. This special book often becomes a treasured memento for the patient's family. This year marked the 36th annual Walk for Love and surpassed all previous records in both registrations and donations.

A record-breaking Walk for Love



For the first time ever, we exceeded 1,000 registrations and raised over \$150,000 for patient care. If you fundraised or made a gift to show your support, thank you.

The Walk for Love brought together individuals, families, friends, sponsors and staff to honour the lives, courage and memories of their loved ones. We were touched by the generosity of our community and the support we received from 1,036 participants and many donors, sponsors, suppliers and volunteers. We recognise that the Walk for Love would not have been as successful if it weren't for their support. This year, Ashlee Murphy was our 2023 Walk for Love Ambassador and walked in memory of her beautiful mum Belinda as part of Team Bella. From little things big things grow

As they say, 'from little things big things grow' and as I reflect back having just celebrated our 5th anniversary, this certainly holds true for Calvary Palliative Home Care.

Our service was established to provide patients with better options as to where their care was delivered with the aim to provide a higher quality of patient and carer experience. Together with our close collaboration with Mary Potter Hospice, we have also ensured that patients have experienced a more seamless transition between care environments of home or hospice when required.

The service began in 2018 with three nurses and now has a team of seven nurses, a social worker and admin support officer as we continue to deliver high quality palliative care and support to those who wish to remain in the privacy and comfort of their own home.

Over the past year, we have provided a record 3235 home visits culminating in more than 11,500 home visits across the five years. Our social worker provides information and options to our patients, empowering them to make decisions and to use their existing strengths and capability to overcome challenges that



arise. Our once 'nursing' service has now evolved into a complete program supporting a holistic based philosophy. With the support of the Foundation, patients and their families have celebrated birthdays and anniversaries, family get-togethers, Easter and Christmas – all helping to create precious memories for families to treasure.
