

From the moment Bob arrived at Mary Potter Hospice, it was clear to his devoted family that he was in the right place. After a very stressful time, Bob's daughters, Lisa and Belinda, told us, "It immediately felt calm. It was safe and nurturing. Finally, we all felt we could breathe."

Lisa said, "The physio came into Dad's room on his first day with such a positive approach. While Dad had capability, she wanted him to do as much as he could himself. She encouraged us to take him out for lunch, go for drives, have pizza, just 'do' things as a family."

"And after being so anxious, we felt reassured. We realised that Dad had come to the Hospice to live out his days, not just come there to die. It was such a different mentality. They were like, '...You're still here Bob, so what can we do to make things as good as they can be for you and your family?' "

Belinda told us, "We started thinking about Christmas. We knew Dad wouldn't be here in December. And we'd been planning to have 'Christmas in July' at Lisa's house. But it wasn't an option anymore – Dad was getting worse."

"When the Hospice asked us if there was anything they could do for us, we mentioned what we'd hoped for. We have a big family – about twenty or so – and we didn't know what might be possible.









But the Foundation immediately came back with a big 'Yes': they would gladly arrange our 'Christmas in July' here."

And this is where you – our incredible donors – came in.

You were the reason we could produce a beautiful 'Christmas in July' celebration for Bob, his wife Cheryl and their lovely family.









On a July Sunday, Mel from the Foundation set up a private room in Connery House, behind the Hospice. The table was full of ham, prawns, chicken, salads, pavlova, trifle, drinks and Christmas tree brownies. There were Dixie Cups for the grandkids. Mel also organised three large Christmas trees that Cheryl decked out in the family's traditional decorations from home. There were bonbons next to each Christmas placemat.

Belinda remembers, "When we walked in and saw what Mel had done, we were blown away. I'd expected a few sandwiches and party pies, but it was beyond anything we could have imagined. The room was so Christmassy! It was perfect."

Bob's grandchildren had prepared their own performances – from jokes and stories to Christmas Carol singing. They coloured-in their Christmas colouring books, and everyone unwrapped their Christmas gifts that, with Lisa's help, Bob had carefully chosen.

Belinda read out some beautiful words from her dad, expressing how very thankful he was that they were all able to be together on this special day. And Bob and his family lit their 'Christmas morning scented candle' – now a family tradition and lit each year to remember this most treasured occasion.

Without doubt, you are the reason we could make this remarkable day happen. When time with their beloved husband, father and grandfather was so precious, you gave Bob's family a priceless gift — a roomful of love and lifelong family memories — all wrapped up in a special July Christmas.


